Seniors got talent!

Seniors with dementia acting in dramas; the same seniors creating arts & crafts like beautiful tie-dye shirts, mosaic and leaves art; ice breakers at single mum's support group; interactive family bonding and learning day - these activities which elicited lots of fun and laughter amongst our clients and beneficiaries were created by Interns at Yong-en.

A part from providing for needy individuals and families in Chinatown and beyond, Yongen creates platform for meaningful learning opportunities and exposure for young people; to build greater awareness of needs on the ground. On 20th July, we were thrilled to hear from nine NTU and Ngee Ann Polytechnic Interns who were with us for 10 and 18 weeks respectively. They shared their experiences working with our two core services of Dementia Day Care Services (DDCS) and Counselling, Social Work and Referral (CSR).

Interns at DDCS led activities with our seniors such as reminiscence therapeutic projects, cognitive stimulation projects, including planning outings for both seniors and their caregivers. Through these platforms, seniors were treated to creative platforms like art, tactile activities and even drama sessions!

Interns at CSR assisted with Yong-en's monthly food ration distribution programs, were involved in single mums and children support groups, and planned our yearly family bonding day event for our beneficiaries.
